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Creating the Circlebooks

Materials

- copies of the CIRCLEBOOK TEMPLATES— pp 5-26
- colored markers and pencils
- scissors
- glue sticks

1. Look through the CIRCLEBOOK TEMPLATES and choose the ones you want the students to complete. (The following instructions use templates from *Marian Anderson* and are for a 4-page circlebook, but you can use more pages if you'd like.)
2. Copy the CIRCLEBOOK TEMPLATES and pass them out to students. Add some pizzazz by copying the writing templates onto colored paper.



3. Ask students to complete the CIRCLEBOOK TEMPLATES.



4. Ask students to cut out the circles.



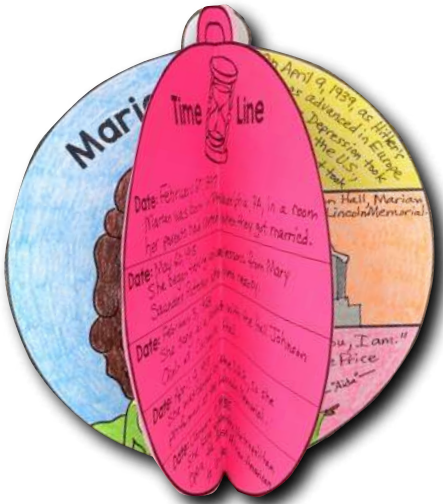
5. Have students fold the circles in half vertically so the information is inside the fold.



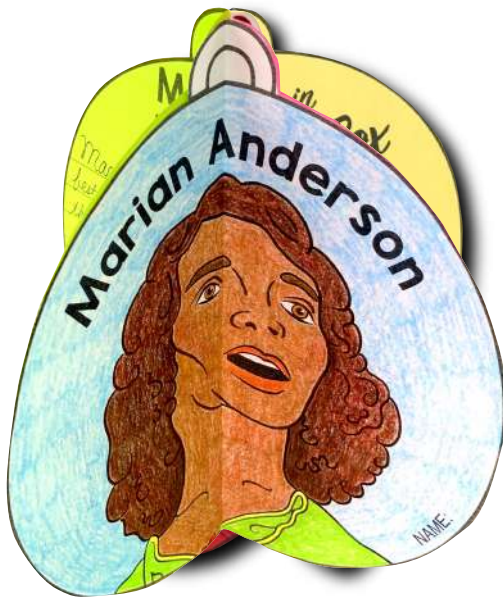
6. Instruct students to glue the back right side of one circle to the back left side of a second circle.



- Then have students glue the back right side of the second circle to the back left side of a third circle.



- Have students glue the back right side of the third circle to the back left side of the fourth circle.
- Finally, students should finish the circlebook by gluing the right side of the last circle to the left side of the very first circle.



- Hang a string across your classroom. Tie varying lengths of thread to the string. Tie a paper clip to the end of each piece of thread. Hang the circlebooks from the paper clips and watch them spin in the breeze!

Other Ideas

Reading Groups: Assign a CIRCLEBOOK PROJECT to a group of students. Invite them to work on some of the templates as a group and divide the others among group members according to strengths and interests.

Homework: You can assign one or more templates to be completed each night at home. Once the pages are finished, guide students through the process of assembling the CIRCLEBOOK PROJECTS.

Longer Circlebook Projects: Circlebooks can be any length. When creating a circlebook that is longer than 10 pages, don't glue the last page to the first page (as described in step 9). Instead, have students glue the backsides of the first and last pages to a sheet of poster board or card stock. Students can trim the poster board to create a cover. Invite them to decorate the cover. Display the books by tacking the front and back covers to a bulletin board, allowing the pages to fan out. Passersby will love the interactive quality of the bulletin board and will be tempted to flip through the pages and learn more about this fascinating person.

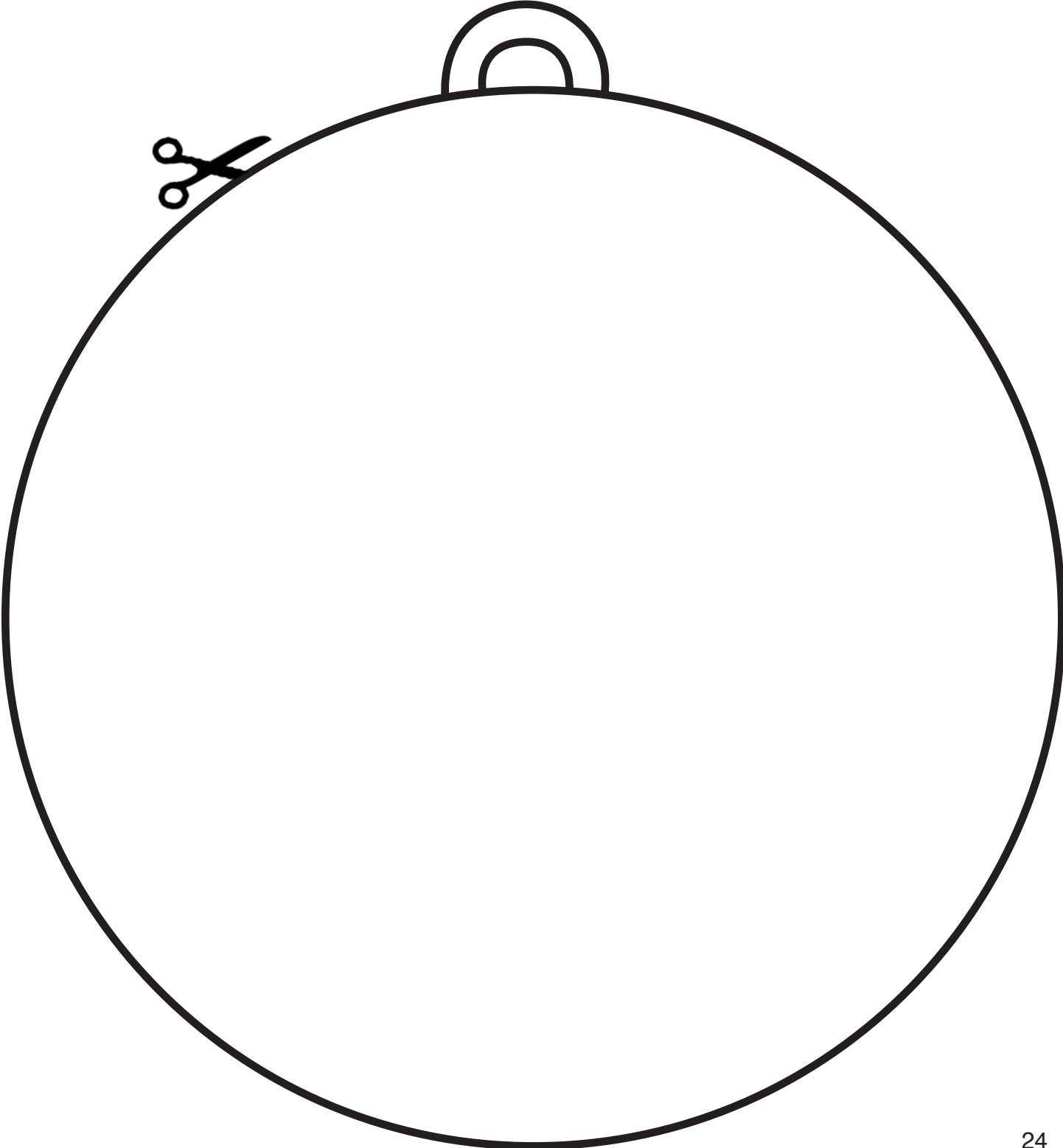
- Line 1 - subject #1

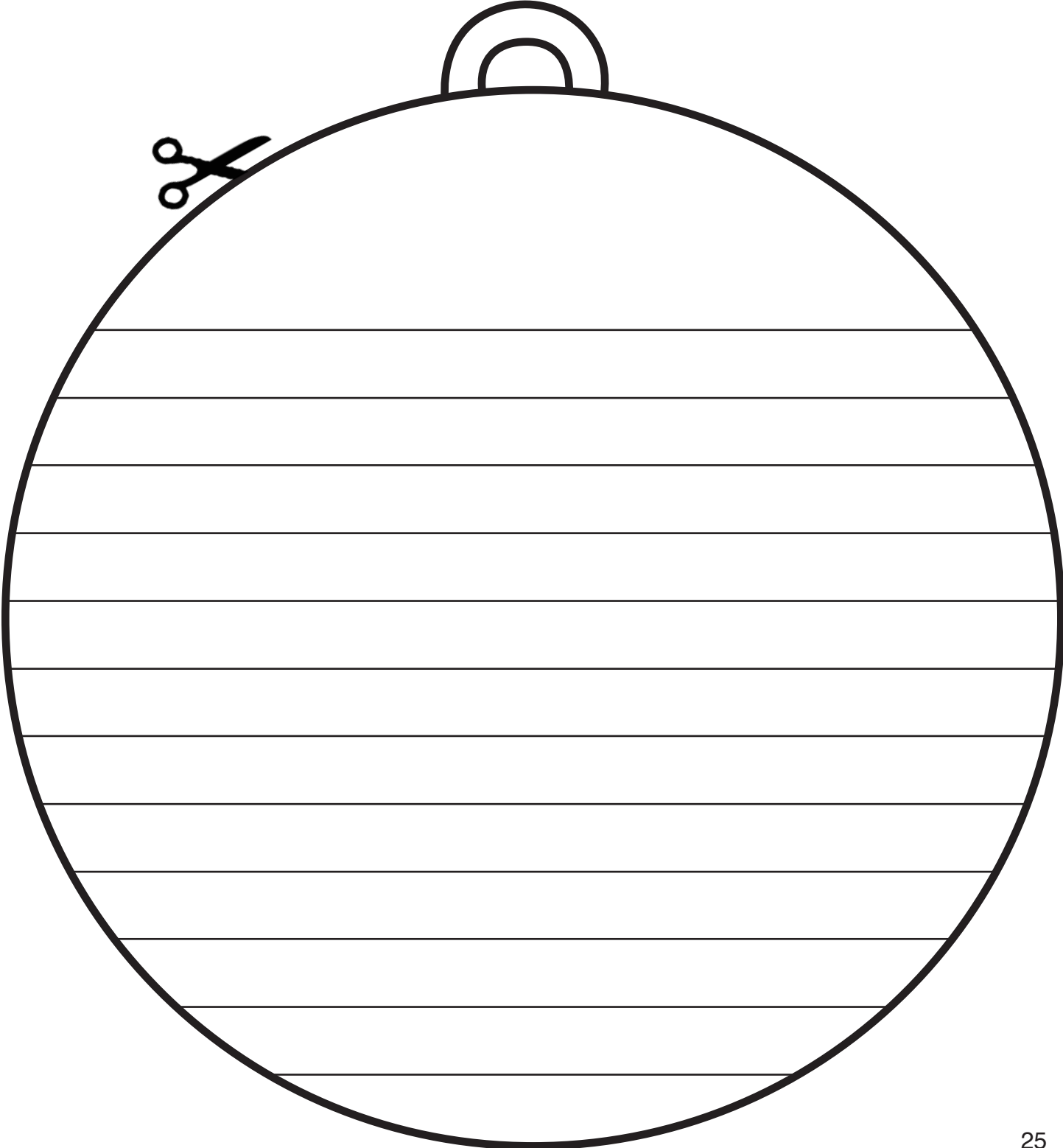
